Heart and mouth are coupled again in Prov. 4:23, 24:

Watch over your heart with all diligence for from it flow the springs of life. Put away from you a deceitful mouth, and put devious lips far from you."

Here again, the cause of bad communication is the condition of one's heart. For the sake of clarification, the term "heart" should be defined. In the New Testament, the term "stands for man's ego." It is simply the person ("the hidden person of the heart"; 1 Pet. 3:4).⁴ There is not much distance between the terms heart ($\kappa \circ \rho \delta i \propto$) and mind ($\nu \circ \delta s$) in the New Testament. Theo Sorg comments on this point:

A striking feature of the New Testament is the essential closeness of kardia to the concept nous, mind. Nous can also have the meaning of person, a man's ego. Heart and mind (noemata lit. thoughts) can be used in parallel (2 Cor. 3:14f.) or
